

First Eagle High Income Fund

Investment Objective and Philosophy

First Eagle High Income Fund, known as the First Eagle High Yield Fund prior to March 1, 2020, seeks to provide investors with a high level of current income. With a bottom-up investment approach and focus on fundamental research, the Fund seeks to maximize risk-adjusted returns by modifying risk exposure throughout the high yield credit cycle.



† These are the actual fund operating expenses prior to the application of fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements. The Adviser has contractually agreed to waive its management fee at an annual rate in the amount of 0.10% of the average daily value of the Fund's net assets for the period through February 28, 2021. This waiver has the effect of reducing the management fee shown in the table for the term of the waiver from 0.70% to 0.60%.

Class I shares require \$1MM minimum investment and are offered without sales charge. Class R6 shares are offered without sales charge. Operating expenses reflect the Fund's total annual operating expenses for the share class of the Fund's most current prospectus, including management fees and other expenses.

1. Effective duration represents the change in the value of a fixed-income security that will result from a 1% change in interest rates, adjusted for bonds with embedded options. Effective duration is stated in years.

2. Weighted average maturity is the weighted average of all the maturities of the securities held in the fund. It can be used as a measure of sensitivity to interest rate changes and market changes. Generally, the longer the maturity, the greater the sensitivity to such changes. It is based on the dollar-weighted average length of time until principal payments must be paid.


30-day SEC Yield is a standard yield calculation developed by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) that allows for fairer comparisons of bond funds. It is based on the most recent 30-day period covered by the fund's filings with the SEC. The yield figure reflects the dividends and interest earned during the period, after the deduction of the fund's expenses. This is also referred to as the "standardized yield." The number is then annualized. This yield does not necessarily reflect income actually earned and distributed by the Fund, and therefore may not be correlated with dividends and distributions paid. Had fees not been waived and/or expenses reimbursed, the SEC Yield would have been lower.

The Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Corporate High Yield Bond Index is composed of fixed-rate, publicly issued, non-investment grade debt, is unmanaged, with dividends reinvested, and is not available for purchase. The index includes both corporate and non-corporate sectors. The corporate sectors are Industrial, Utility, and Finance, which include both U.S. and non-U.S. corporations. 

Allocation By Industry (%)⁷




Allocation By Credit Quality (%)^{6,7}
